METROQUEST COMMUNITY SURVEY

Summary | May 2020

The City of Thousand Oaks conducted an online community survey for the General Plan Update, 702045, from February 28,2020 - May 4, 2020. The purpose of this survey was to confirm and prioritize feedback from the community on their values, issues facing the City, and vision for the future initially collected through a diverse engagement program held in Fall 2019.


In this survey, which was created with Metroquest, an online platform, community members were asked to prioritize top strengths and challenges in Thousand Oaks and map where future growth and change (e.g., housing, entertainment, open space) should be located in the city. The survey collected 461 responses. The following is a description of the survey questions and summary of responses collected.

The survey consisted of 5 pages or screens:

- Welcome
- Strengths & Values
- Issues & Challenges
- Map Exercise
- Wrap Up



Community Strengths & Values



The strengths and values screen included a list of eight community reported strengths and values. Participants were asked to rank their **top four** out of eight community strengths and values from the list. Results below indicate that *parks and open space* was the highest prioritized community strength/value, followed by *safe and welcoming community*, *quality education*, and *suburban character*. The Updated Score column considers both the number of votes and average ranking.

In addition to the list of eight Strengths and Values, participants were able to "suggest another" community strength and value. These results are in Appendix Table 5.

Issues & Challenges



The issues and challenges screen listed eight community reported issues and challenges facing Thousand Oaks. This screen prompted participants to rank their top four out of eight issues and challenges from the list provided. Results below indicate that *becoming* "the Valley" was the top prioritized concern, followed by *housing challenges, traffic congestion*, *public safety*, and *lack of mobility options*. The Updated Score column in Table 2 considers both the number of votes and average ranking.

In addition to the list provided, participants were able to "suggest another" issues and challenge. These results are listed in Appendix Table 6.

Where Should Growth Go?



The mapping exercise consisted of an interactive aerial map of Thousand Oaks with some of the community's most valued areas in color: single family residential homes (shown in yellow), and parks and open space (shown in green). Through the first phase of community engagement, feedback indicated a strong desire for no targeted or significant change to these areas. The areas of Thousand Oaks that remain visible on this map could be considered for moderate change over the next 20–30 years to evolve and meet the changing priorities, new State regulations and market and economic forces within the City.

On this screen participants were invited to place icons on the map to show where they want to see future growth in Thousand Oaks. Options included *mixed use*, *townhomes*, *multifamily housing*, *parks and open space*, *entertainment*, and *office*/R&D. Participants could place as many icons on the map as they like and anywhere within the interactive screen.

Table 3 shows that *mixed use* was the most popular icon with 561 markers and *multifamily* was the second most popular with 402 markers. Analysis of the mapping responses indicate that respondents wanted to see mixed use throughout the City, but most notably around The Oaks and Janss Malls, Thousand Oaks Boulevard, and the Rancho Conejo industrial area. Respondents also wanted to see multifamily paralleling the 101 Freeway corridor to the north and south, most notably on or near Thousand Oaks Boulevard.


Participants were able to provide additional comments on the mapping experience, these results are in Appendix Table 7.


Density Map Results

The graphics below illustrate the Where Does Growth Go? exercise results through density maps that report the number of icons placed in an area. Colored circles displayed with a number indicate the count of that icon within the immediate area. Across all maps, red circles represent the highest concentration of icons (100+ icons), yellow circles represent a moderate concentration (10-99 icons) and blue circles represent a low concentration of icons (3-9 icons).


Overall, these maps indicate a general desire for future changes – growth or redevelopment-to be channeled along the 101 corridor, Thousand Oaks Boulevard, near the Rancho Conejo industrial area, and other major existing centers of activity like the Oaks and Janss Malls, and neighborhood shopping centers.












Ventura County's average annual temperature INCREASED by 2.6 degrees Celsius from 1895 to 2018 ... representing the LARGEST temperature increase for any county in the entire United States, according to an analysis of NOAA temperature data published in the Washington Post in a report on extreme Climate Change. The associated risks of temperature rise, drought, water scarcity, Climate Change, wildfires, and air pollution from land development, traffic, and fossil fuel use and proliferation are urgent concerns that have the very real potential to make Thousand Oaks an undesirable and even perilous place to live. It is essential that the General Plan include comprehensive and effective strategies to protect our natural environment, build resilience, and minimize the above-noted adverse impacts. The General Plan is our best opportunity to secure our city's long-term prospects, health, safety and future economic vitality by implementing a Circular Economic Plan NOW that incorporates aggressive strategies requiring clean, fossil-free, renewable-energy-powered electricity, transportation, and homes/buildings, along with measures to lower our city's temperature (including stringent protection of existing heritage oaks, native trees and natural spaces, together with a mass planting of additional native trees); to preserve, protect and enhance our clean water resources, our safety, and our quality of life.

Fires and evacuation is a real problem. When asked, I have heard *PII REDACTED* say that evacuation is the fire departments problem. His response is extremely disturbing. Planning has everything to do with evacuation and natural disasters. If TO is over crowded our streets will not flow. We only have the 101, TO Blvd and Hillcrest to pass through town. People will be trapped, worse than they were last fire season.

If I think traffic is a problem I'm hesitant to say because then the politicians will put us on a "road diet". There's too many office buildings in westlake that add to the traffic congestion. Don't add more buses or bus lanes like the Valley and LA!

I adamantly oppose the proposed buildout of our Civic Arts Center, and the over-development which is steadily being approved on Thousand Oaks Blvd. (I also oppose the narrowing of that main artery.) and other main thoroughfares throughout our community. All of our major streets and freeways are experiencing a tremendous growth in traffic (and in the case of the former, parking) congestion. This pattern of unwanted overbuilding is not simply a source of commuter frustration; it is also creating significant health and safety issues as it contributes to additional toxic emissions, harmful air quality, and an increasingly dangerous situation during increasingly frequent wildfire disaster evacuation events.

With single family use zoning and huge parking minimums, traffic is inevitable. We built our cities such that we rely on our cars too much, so obvioulsy there's going to be traffic! The city needs to look at ways to reduce traffic without compromising growth especially in housing. We need to look at areas that can be rezoned to denser mixed use development with lowered parking minimums. Especially in areas ripe for redevelopment like the T.O. Blvd corridor and in "sprawling" commercial/retial areas like the T.O. & Janns Mall. In these areas, options for walking and biking needs to be proposed. On the whole, the city needs to look towards old streetcar suburbs for inspiration. Maybe in the long long term, far flung single family neighborhoods can be connected with streetcars along Lynn, Borchard, Moorpark, and Erbs to T.O.'s new denser downtown areas!

With single family use zoning and huge parking minimums comes traffic. The city needs to look at areas that can be rezoned to denser mixed use development eapecially along the T.O. Blvd corridor, and in "sprawling" commercial/retail areas like the T.O. & Janss Mall. And in these areas, promote pedestrianism and biking. Maybe look at old streetcar suburbs for inspiration. More of the traffic lights in the City need to be timed or made "smart". At too many of them, you sit and wait even though no traffic is coming from the opposite direction. On the main streets, boulevards, need to be timed so if you do the speed limit, you will not hit red lights. Housing is a global challenge right now especially in cities. The issue will not be solved by Thousand Oaks. It has more to do with growing economic disparities than city planning. It's sad to see city officials talk about low income housing while what they approve (and waive fees and rules for) are all expensive housing. I'd would like to see some low income housing. Look at what the city approves as opposed to what they claim.

Rentals are out of control. Even new apartment pricing is out of control. Young kids and working people can't afford to live here. So we build new apartments and charge \$1700 for a one bedroom? Who can afford that. Condos behind a strip mall start at \$590K? A condo. Housing is expensive and exclusive here now. It wasn't like that before. It's all about making money and who cares if the people that work here can afford to live here. That's a bad way to think.

There's no place left to build. So now we are looking at high density housing. A one bedroom apartment averages around \$1700 here. Housing costs are sky high. Our college grads can't afford to live here.

There is no where to put new single family housing. We must look at rezoning and densification along T.O. blvd corridor and large retail/commercial areas (T.O. Mall & Janns Mall) to expand the citiy's housing stock. Look at New Urbanist solutions for infill housing.

The high cost of housing in T.O. is simply due to the fact that it is nice to live here. Building a bunch of apartments will only degrade the quality of life for residents and line the pockets of developers.

There is nowhere to put new single family housing. The Conejo Valley was built out with Dos Vientos being the last place to put single family housing. We must look at rezoning and

densification along the T.O. blvd corridor and large retial/commercial areas (T.O. Mall and Janss Mall) to expand the city's housing stock. Look at New Urbanist solutions for infill housing. Way to expensive.

Please read "Last Child in the Woods" by Richard Louv. Parks, vacant lots, and space for nature in the midst of our city (not just designated open Space) is so important. It makes me sad that money and greed are driving decisions about our city.

Don't turn Thousand Oaks into the SF Valley. We moved here for the wide open spaces and small community atmosphere

Continue to resist the packaging of people onto each other with high rise structures and housing. We don't want to be like LA or San Francisco or the Valley. That is why many of us move here and support this community.

We moved here to get away from Hollywood and LA, not to bring it with us. Growth is necessary, but TO seems to have done a good job of managing it. Scooters are now a scourge elsewhere, they are not an auto substitute and do not mitigate traffic, so they must be prevented. And homelessness is a mental health, addiction, and broken windows crisis, NOT a housing crisis; there is plenty of help for the temporarily unhoused and they are not the problem, the chronically homeless who find community in encampments are the problem, both for health and safety. Have some temporary nighttime shelters around and never stop enforcing laws and they will not congregate here. Your open space preservation is also key. Finally, traffic congestion can be controlled with proper signals and timing and better planned entrance and exits to avoid backups, it works if your traffic department is creative.

We recently moved here (2 years ago or so) for the great schools, weather, air quality, calm life, and open space. We hope those qualities can be maintained. We don't believe growth should be a priority, the current population density is excellent. Not too sleepy, not too busy. While I understand the desire to have affordable housing, not every area / town / city can be affordable. When you have an excellent combination of features, like Thousand Oaks does, it's naturally expensive. It's a privilege to live in Thousand Oaks, not a right. There are many affordable communities within 20 minutes that can serve those who require more affordable housing. Imagine people asking that Malibu make it affordable for them to live there. Not every city can be affordable. To become affordable, it seems we'd have to grow the town substantially, thereby destroying what makes the place attractive and unique.
